The Canton school district continues to provide the children of this community with a strong PreK-12 experience. With attention to excellence and equity, we seek to create a school culture and climate that is safe, welcoming and joyful. The Canton Public Schools staff attend to the academic, social and emotional needs of students in support of developing their individual potential and strength as a community. Overall, the district aims to provide every school, classroom and student what is essential to support excellence and equity, including high quality staff with meaningful professional development, facilities that are maintained responsibly and upgraded in alignment with the Facilities Master Plan, and a budget that provides what is needed to enhance every child's growth and development. Visual Arts:

- Six high school students received awards for their work from the Scholastic Art and Writing Awards.
- For a third year, high school art students worked in teams to paint 10 rain barrels that were created by engineering students. The rain barrels were auctioned off at the District Art Show to raise money for the installation of a water bottle refill station in the gym area. This is the second water bottle refill station that has been installed at the high school as a result of the rain barrel project.
- A team of Canton High School Video Production students planned and produced the 3rd LipDub video which highlights the entire high school community.
- Under the direction of the GMS art teachers, a group of GMS students created a mural to celebrate and commemorate GMS's participation in the Iditarod's "Teacher on the Trail".
- The community art exhibit "Artists in Bloom" was held in March. This exhibit was a collaborative effort with the Canton Garden Club to raise money for the Canton High School Scholarship Fund. For the exhibit, 150 K-12 student's artwork was displayed at Pequitside Farm, with members of the Canton Garden Club creating floral arrangements.
- Students in grades 3-12 were invited to create environmental advocacy posters by community members coordinating the GreenFest event. Over 100 posters were created district-wide.
- The department participated in the district's STEAM week. Art teachers at every level infused their instruction to highlight STEAM concepts in the artmaking process.

The District's FY20 budget, approved at Annual Town Meeting, totaled \$44,114,362. This 4.05% increase from the previous year's budget supports the District to effectively meet the needs of our students from grades PK-12.

The FY20 budget supported the following actions:

- Advance operating expenses to support the Strategic Framework and its four Strategic Objectives
- Continue to meet the contractual obligations of all Collective Bargaining Agreements
- Address rising special education out-of-district expenses first appearing in FY18 and carrying over to FY20
