STRATEGIC FRAMEWORK

The Strategic Framework of the Canton Public Schools serves as our guiding document outlining the conditions we seek to create in the establishment of the very best learning environment for every student. This has never been more important than during a time requiring significant adjustments due to the impact of the global pandemic. On March 13, 2020, our school buildings were closed because of the novel coronavirus. Staff and students did not return to school for the remainder of the academic year, nor did school open in its traditional fashion the following September. Instead, as COVID-19 continued to impact our ways of engaging, the Canton Public Schools transitioned from remote learning at home to a combination of remote learning and in-school learning.

Preparing for this new form of student engagement required significant planning. At the center of the planning process was an unwavering commitment to students and the creation of the very best conditions possible for their learning which is defined within our Strategic Framework. The translation of our Strategic Framework to this very different context produced the following commitments in the planning - safety; teaching and learning; social emotional supports; structural supports for students; and, technology and digital learning systems.

Committing to the creation of student learning across these five critical areas supported a new form of school during a very challenging time, described consistently as unprecedented. With the use of feedback from surveys of staff and families, adjustments were made to improve the

learning situation while the most successful strategies were continued and made even more effective. As our society and schools recover from the pandemic, the most impactful strategies will be continued in order to draw upon the successes of such a challenging time.

With perseverance, flexibility, creativity and collaboration the Canton school district continues to provide children with meaningful school experiences. The long-term Strategic Objectives of the Strategic Framework listed below will continue to define our aspirations and support the improvement of the Canton Public Schools.

Students of the Canton Public Schools have historically performed well across multiple measures, including state and national standardized assessments. Due to the school closures in Spring 2020, the annual MCAS testing was suspended, and we do not have updated scores to report. While the MCAS is one data point that helps us to monitor our progress as a district and at each of our schools, we acknowledge that it is just one data point. Given the absence of MCAS data, we have implemented additional assessments in our schools to ensure that we are gathering the necessary data to monitor student progress. The STAR benchmark assessment is being used as a universal screener for our students in grades K-5, and Edulastic is being used in grades 6-12. The data gathered in these assessments provides feedback on student performance against the state standards.

The College Board revised the testing process for students enrolled in AP courses during the 2019-20 school year. This resulted in changes in the test structure, yet our students performed well as evidenced in the chart below.

While standardized tests provide one source of data on student achievement, these tests do not provide critical information about the full range of the student experience in our schools. The District has begun developing a comprehensive set of measures, the *Indicators of Excellence*, to provide that full description of student and district success. The *Indicators of Excellence* will become the metrics used to gauge our progress toward the Long-term Strategic Objectives outlined in the district's Strategic Framework 2018-2023.

STAFF AND PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

2020 Spring MassCue at Holy Cross- Robotics for All- CHS teachersMs. Shanna Belenky and Ms. Katie Healey were awarded funding for a grant where in turn they created a Unified Robotics program. Ms. Belenky, along with CHSstudents, Maribeth Sullivan, Mariella Ruggeri, Tiffany Ye, presented their program at this conference. Below is a program description.

Unified Robotics provides students with and without intellectual disabilities the opportunity to learn engineering concepts through experience and discovery. Students work collaboratively to build, program and design robots that can move, see and respond to external stimuli. Students of all abilities use hands-on engineering techniques to discover solutions to design challenges and document outcomes of their experiences. Robotics for All engages students with and without disabilities in learning that is both specific in its technological relevance and life skills as it requires patience, problem-solving, trouble-shooting, collaboration, and communication.

MA World Language Framework Panelist - Ms. Heidi Olson, PreK-12 World Language Department Coordinator, represented the district for this state-level DESE committee charged with building the new 2021 World Languages Framework She served as a 2019-2020 Massachusetts World Languages Review Panelist for Communities. Here is some information from the Framework draft about the focus of the Communities group:

Practice 8: Communities - Interact and communicate with intercultural competence and confidence to engage and responsibly collaborate with a variety of multilingual communities at home and around the world. Proficiency in multiple languages becomes a lifelong skill when students maintain engagement in the target-language community. Whether using the language for enjoyment or enrichment of other interests, maintaining friendships and relationships with diverse speakers/signers of the language, or making a local or global impact, community engagement motivates students to cultivate their language skills over the course of their lives. To engage in World Language communities, when supported by appropriate linguistic scaffolding based on proficiency level, student age, and grade level:

• Students use the target language both within and beyond the classroom to consider diverse perspectives, build empathy, and act collectively to improve communities.

Students use the target language to recognize strengths, set goals for growth, and reflect upon progress in using languages for enjoyment, enrichment, career advancement, and building diverse relationships.

Massachusetts Association of School Superintendents (MASS) Participant: Director of Teaching and Learning, Deborah Rooney, was invited to participate on the advisory committee to provide guidance on the DESE Early Literacy Initiative.

Visual Arts 2020:

- In the spring of 2020 the Visual Arts Department launched *Canton Creates!*, an online gallery, to highlight the creative accomplishments of our students working remotely. We are in the process of updating this online gallery to showcase student artwork being created in our hybrid learning environment this year. The site will be re-launched at the end of January.
- Five high school students received a total of six Art Awards for their work from the *Scholastic Art and Writing Awards*.
- Two students in their Junior year were selected to attend the Massachusett Art Education Association Art All-State program, a prestigious state-wide workshop that brings together talented students from schools across the Commonwealth to collaborate with mentor working artists. This year, students participated in workshops virtually and created individual Tape Art which they sent on to Art All-State for a Virtual Mural which will soon be displayed in 2021.
- During remote learning in the spring of 2020, Galvin Middle School students engaged in interdisciplinary learning that brought together learning in their academic subjects with learning in art. For example, in response to the reading of *Seedfolks*, 7th grade students created flowers with recycled materials, as well as garden flags.
- During remote learning in the spring of 2020, elementary art students continued their learning about art with inspiration and instruction from their teachers through a weekly "menu" of creative prompts and resources. Each week students could choose art activities from an interactive list of artmaking experiences depending on their interest, ability level, and supplies available at home. Examples of these projects included assembling a color wheel from found objects at home, exploring Tate Museum's interactive digital art games, drawing from observation, and making playdough from a recipe.
- During the 2019-2020 school year, Galvin Middle School students in the Art club began work on a collaborative mural celebrating the arts and creativity in their school. The mural will be completed when we return to our normal school schedule.
- The CHS Lip Dub (created in 2019) was recognized by the <u>National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences</u>.
- During the fall of 2020, a select group of CHS students taking Video Production class collaborated with students in Japan for a cross-cultural film-making project. Pushing the

- boundaries of long distance communication via Zoom and online editing programs, these students created short films with their Japanese classmates. Details of the project were published in the Canton Citizen and <u>Wicked Local</u>.
- During the fall of 2020, adjusting to new challenges and limitations that social distancing brought to spectating sports, CHS Video Production students helped to provide Cable Access Programming so students, families, and community members could watch school sports via broadcast programming - Globe Article
- While learning remotely in the spring of 2020, CHS students taking Video Production classes created hand washing PSAs which aired on Canton Community Television.
- During the spring of 2020, during asynchronous remote learning, *AP Art & Design* students continued to push boundaries in their "Sustained Investigation Inquiry" to submit well-received portfolios to the College Board with an overall strong score average.
- Student artwork from every school in the district was chosen for display in the offices and conference rooms at the *Marilyn G. Rodman Educational and Administrative Offices*. In February 2020, a reception was held for student artists and their families to celebrate their creative accomplishments.
