- C. **Student Member Report** Chair Merenda, and Committee members thanked all student members for their contributions and commitment to the Committee this school year and wished them well in their future endeavors.

# D. Superintendent's Report Superintendent Highlights

<u>Vaccination Clinic</u>: In collaboration with the Town Department of Public Health, Canton police and fire, and Dr. Muse, CPS hosted a vaccine clinic in the Rodman gym on May 26 for students ages 12-22. The clinic was open to students attending CPS, Blue Hills Regional Technical School, St. John's School, as well as the parents/guardians of students who have not yet received the first dose of the vaccine. The second dose vaccine clinic will be held on June 16 at the Rodman Gymnasium.

<u>Honor Thy Teacher</u>: Request to support the Canton Alliance for Public Education (CAPE) by contributing to their *Honor Thy Teacher* campaign. Proceeds go toward funding annual grants for Canton Public School teachers. These grants provide the seed money for innovative enrichment programs that are not part of the annual school budget.

<u>CAPT and CAPE Volunteers Needed</u>: The success of our district's CAPTs and CAPE rests on the effectiveness of parent volunteers. These organizations are in danger of not continuing this work due to the lack of parent-volunteer support. Superintendent Fischer-Mueller encouraged attendance.

ESSER Grant: A portion of the ESSER grant, which was awarded to CPS in March 2021 in the amount of \$10,000, was dedicated to funding programs to support the social emotional needs of students. As a result, the District has collaborated with the YMCA to provide structured supports during recess at all three elementary schools, three days/week. Additional funds will be used to support a therapeutic garden at the high school.

### **Updates**

<u>CHS Principal Finalists</u>: Following a rigorous interview process, CPS has identified three finalists for the CHS Principal position. To maximize stakeholder involvement and get feedback on our three finalists. There was a 9:00 a.m. community forum for each candidate during their respective finalist day Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, and one afternoon forum for each finalist on Wednesday afternoon at 4:00 p.m., 5:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m.

<u>Early Release Days</u>: Superintendent Fischer-Mueller shared that the primary function of Wednesday afternoon is collaboration. Research supports collaboration between teachers in both general education and special education as a means to improve student outcomes by affording staff the time to meet to share ideas, conduct meetings and refine the impacts of their instructional practices. Research shows that effective collaboration improves student and staff performance. Superintendent Fischer-Mueller shared examples of research. Listed below are some examples of work being done at our schools during early release Wednesdays that supports student achievement and ensures a collaborative school climate.

#### **Indicators of Excellence**

<u>CAASA Webinar</u>: Wednesday, May 19, CAASA sponsored the Teens and Tech webinar hosted by Clinical Director Jon Mattleman. There were over 100 families registered for this virtual event. The presentation focused on teens and technology, the impact of mental health and coping in positive ways.

Scholastic Honors Night: On Tuesday, May 18, 77 seniors were honored at the annual Canton High School Scholastic Honors Night. The evening provides distinction to students who have demonstrated outstanding creativity, scholarship, leadership and citizenship. Thank you to Principal Turcotte and Marsha Armando for their outstanding work in planning this event, and Ms. Nichola Galagher for attending on behalf of the School Committee.

Scholarship Night: A total of 86 CHS Seniors were awarded \$208,300 in scholarship money from 72 local organizations. Congratulations to these very deserving members of the 2021 senior class and thank you to our scholarship donors for their generosity. A special thank you to Ms. Meredith Chamberland and Ms. Anne Murray for their efforts in coordinating this memorable event, and to Ms. Kendall O'Halloran for attending on behalf of the School Committee.

World Language Recognition Night: A total of 110 students in grades 7-12 were honored on May 20 during World Language Recognition Night. Thank you to Ms. Heidi Olson and the World Language staff for their work in supporting students on their path to language proficiency. Congratulations to all honorees, and a very special congratulations to Senior Ms. Camila Cruz who earned her Seal of Biliteracy in both Spanish and French. Thank you, also to Ms. Kristian Merenda for attending on behalf of the School Committee.

<u>Project Lead the Way</u>: During the 2019-2020 school year, Katie Healey, CHS Engineering teacher, applied for and received a grant from STEM Mass Ed to start a Project Lead The

Way (PLTW) course pathway at CHS. Due to the pandemic, our timeline and use of this grant money has been delayed into the 2021-22 school year. At this time, we have had 27 students registered to take the PLTW Engineering course and 27 students signed up to take the PLTW Computer Science Principles course next year. Teachers Katie Healey and Sean Hulseman have also registered for summer PD sessions that are slated to begin on June 21 to help them learn the curriculum and instruction of these courses.

Once our teachers are fully trained, we will be using grant money to begin to purchase the supplies needed to run the courses effectively. The process for rehabbing the metal and wood shop spaces into a more contemporary Innovation Lab as a part of this grant has begun. The grant will allow for a large amount of equipment to be purchased to better outfit this space for the work done in both the PLTW courses and other engineering and design courses offered at CHS. We are continuing to look for additional grants and funding sources, including CAPE grants to continue to rehab and convert these spaces into an appropriate innovative and design space.

Art Student Citations: Monday, May 24th, Senator Timilty visited Canton High School to present citations to the following students to honor them for their involvement in the state-wide Youth Art Month "Art Connects Us" exhibit. #### E. New Business

2. <u>PreK and Elementary School Improvement Plans (SIPs) Review</u>: Principals presented their year end SIPs for review. All plans are aligned with the strategic framework. School council members from all schools were acknowledged and thanked.

Ms. Donna Kilday shared school demographics, student learning outcomes in math and literacy, and student learning outcomes in social emotional learning. Additionally, PreK student experiences were shared i.e. kindness celebrations, story hours, spirit days and schoolwide diversity and community celebrations. A summary of progress towards the 2020-2021 school priorities includes strong gains in the development of key early literacy skills, increased student awareness in respecting differences in race and culture utilizing the social science and history standards, and significant progress toward the priority of analyzing the social emotional needs of students and the effectiveness of our current programming.

Elementary principals shared information about their school demographics, school experiences and community survey results. Some Hansen school experiences included a focus on connections and all students (continuum and RLP) feeling an authentic sense of belonging, activities included: Great Kindness Challenge, celebrating our diversity and backgrounds through texts/read-alouds, art, and research, grade level T-Shirt design challenge, virtual whole school sing-a-longs, daily classroom morning meetings and/or closing connections, and more.

JFK school experiences included: classroom as community, innovative and experiential learning, celebrating diversity and various grade level experiences.

Mr. Green shared that the Luce school survey will be going out on June 6. He also shared Luce school experiences that included: students created letters of gratitude for local Veterans, students in 3rd-5th grade engaged in a virtual school musical, daily principal morning messages for hybrid, in-school and RLP students Top Secret Science Kits K-5, virtual SHINE assemblies and We Thinker's program that focuses on Social and Emotional Learning and more.

Each school SIP contained important action steps for the three elementary schools and their progress related to achieving academic excellence and ensuring equity, transforming teaching and learning and cultivating school climate and culture.

3. <u>Policy EBCFA</u>: Mr. Folan, Chair Merenda and Ms. O'Halloran presented policy EBCFA, Face Coverings, for review. Masks are currently not required for outdoor recess. Governor Baker and DESE guidelines state that masks are still required for indoor activities. These proposed policy changes align with these state guidelines. The proposed policy also states that *The School Committee intends to revisit this policy on June 10, 2021 to consider any DESE or state guidance updates that would impact summer programming.* Chair Merenda explained that legal counsel informed her that the School Committee does not have the discretion to eliminate the mask requirement inside school buildings until the Governor/DESE has done so.

Mr. Rae reaffirmed his opposition to the face covering requirement. Mr. Rae said he would like to move to rescind the policy on July 1, 2021, or sooner, if the MA DESE guidelines changed prior to then. Members suggested changing the wording in the proposed policy from consider to align *any DESE or state guidance updates...*. Other considerations and factors considered are the current CTA MOA and local BOH feedback. Superintendent Fischer-Mueller shared that the DESE Commissioner stated that what the mask policy is at the end of the school year will likely carry over to the summer programming regulations.

4. <u>Cabot Fund</u>: Mr. Nectow presented the Cabot Fund recipients for review and approval. The Cabot Fund promotes healthy outdoor life. Ms. Gobbi shared applicants' requests, their plans for the use of funds and the CPS recommendations for fund allocations. Mr. Nectow shared previous year's awards.

5. <u>Vanpool Contract</u>: Mr. Nectow presented the Vanpool transportation contract for a vote of approval. Vanpool is the primary vendor for OOD transportation. The recommendation was to sign a three year contract with Vanpool with a 4% rate increase in year one, and a 2% increase in years 2 and 3. Ms. Gallagher proposed, given the school budget this year, that we ask for flexibility in the increase rate. Mr. Nectow will make that request to Vanpool.
